Project Bootstrap

Project Bootstrap is one of the unique programs that BTHC is looking forward to expanding in 2017! Project Bootstrap began as a program under the State Attorney General to help young fathers establish paternity and develop a path to employment to support their child. When the pilot program ended in early the 2000s, the Baylor College of Medicine Teen Health Clinics saw a need to continue this very successful project. It was revitalized it in 2008 with a grant from the Madison Charitable Foundation and the Foundation for Teen Health. Today, we continue some of the fundamentals of the original program and have now expanded it to include young women and non-parents. Project Bootstrap looks to connect teens and young adults with job training and careerrelated opportunities that will lead to stable,



sufficient employment. Participants in this program are provided resources in the form of three "routes": GED preparation literacy, and health/wellness. While pursuing these "routes", each participant may be awarded a grant up to \$1,100 which may be used to subsidize any needs that they may experience while completing and testing, completing a vocational/technical certificate (e.g. welding, HVAC certificate), and/or enrolling in **workshops** that address issues like career development, financial their goals. Our Lawn Clinic is now the permanent home of Bootstrap complete with computer lab for GED and Job applications, counseling room, coordinator office space and a conference room for group meetings, plus easy access to medical care.




JOIN OUR TEAM

North East Adolescent Program

The North East Adolescent Project (NEAP) is an educational outreach component of the **Baylor College of Medicine Teen** Health Clinic. In 1987 Commissioner El Franco Lee created the Street Olympics as a recreation program. He expanded the program to include social services, health care, educational and vocational needs of the youth in our community. The programs include an Aquatic program, 3 on 3 basketball, Discovery Camp, Travelling Naturalist and the North East Adolescent Program. NEAP was established in 1989 as part of the expansion in order to reach young people in high-risk areas to lower the incidence of teen pregnancy, birth defects, infant mortality, and STDs in these areas. Outreach workers travel to schools, churches, and apartment complexes to provide small group discussions and workshops that promote a healthy lifestyle. Teens learn ways to respond to sexual pressure and how to prevent

teen pregnancy and sexually transmitted diseases. Prenatal education and case management services are available to support pregnant and parenting teens. NEAP also provides information on all the Teen Clinics locations to improve access to medical care.

NEAP also provides information on other resources that may be needed by the young people they see. This is done through the coalition of 36 major providers of health, medical, and social services to Houston teens living in this precinct that NEAP works with to enhance care. The coalition meets quarterly to share experiences, discuss the health needs of inner city teens, and make programming and scheduling decisions that will have the most impact in these areas.

Our new Precinct One Commissioner Rodney Ellis will continue the NEAP program and his support of the Baylor College of Medicine Teen Health Clinics.

FOUNDATION FOR TEEN HEALTH Mission

The Foundation for Teen Health was formed in 1990 to support the work of the ten Baylor College of Medicine Teen Health Clinics. The goal of the foundation is to raise funds and awareness of the programs provided to young men and women at the Teen Health Clinics. The Foundation for Teen Health Board of Directors has made a personal commitment to the programs of the Teen Health Clinics and to the young men and women who use the clinics. Besides participating in raising funds for the clinics, our directors host health fairs, neighborhood canvassing and basketball tournaments to educate the young people of the community about the services available at the clinics. The Foundation for Teen Health wants the network of ten Baylor College of Medicine Teen Health Clinics to be the medical home for the young people of Houston and to give them the resources to lead healthy lives enabling them to become successful members of society.
